





# The Confident 1100' for Resurgence...

Kerala has so far done a commendable job in its fight against the COVID-19 pandemic. Now, we are entering a stage where we are starting to live with the pandemic. As I had mentioned in an earlier issue, life has to go on, we have to move forward. Our Break the Chain campaign and COVID-19 containment strategy have together restricted the spread of the disease from peaking to the previously predicted unmanageable levels. Our Covid positive cases for August were lesser than what we had anticipated, despite increasing the number of tests.



After the successful implementation of Rs. 20,000 crore COVID-19 package, we have now launched a '100 Days, 100 Projects' campaign. We aim to complete 100 projects in the State in the next 100 days as part of an action plan. We expect this to boost the socioeconomic status of the State during this tumultuous period. This is the State government's Onam gift to the people of Kerala. Kerala's economic growth should not be stagnant during the Covid season. We have to face new challenges as per the changing needs of the people. We will speed up projects which were delayed due to the pandemic. This action plan will also include the fulfillment of the promises made by the government and enhance relief measures.

We will provide food kits for all ration card holders for the next four months. This is in continuation to the much-lauded food kits given during Onam and lock down. The kits will be distributed through ration shops, and would directly benefit about 88 lakh ration cardholders in the State. When this Government had come to power, the distribution of welfare pensions was in disarray. We streamlined its distribution and paid off even the arrears, and gradually increased the pension from Rs. 600 to Rs. 1,300. The number of beneficiaries has also been increased from 35 lakhs to 58 lakhs during this period. Now, we have decided to increase the social welfare pension by Rs. 100 to Rs. 1,400 and distribute it on a monthly basis as well. These measures will further strengthen our comprehensive social security net.

Government has made great strides in improving the infrastructure of government hospitals and enhancing its human resources. As

part of this ongoing campaign, the public health system will be further strengthened in the fight against COVID-19. Since the outbreak, 9,768 healthcare workers have been recruited through the National Health Mission. If required, more staff will be added to the health system within the next 100 days. The operation of COVID-19 First Line Treatment Centres will be made more efficient and the number of tests will be increased to

50,000 per day.

The Government aims to transform the Primary Health Centres (PHCs) into fully equipped Family Health Centres (FHCs) with hospital facilities. So far 386 FHCs have been completed and commissioned. In the next 100 days, 153 FHCs will be inaugurated. 24 new buildings will be completed in Medical Colleges, District, General and Taluk

Hospitals. 10 new dialysis centres, 9 scanning centres, 3 Cath labs and 2 modern cancer treatment facilities will be completed within 100 days as well.

All government schools with more than 500 students are being upgraded with KIIFB funding. 35 school buildings constructed at a cost of Rs 5 crores are being inaugurated as part of the campaign, in the next 100 days. 14 school buildings constructed at a cost of Rs 3 crores are about to be inaugurated. The construction of 27 other school buildings will be completed and the construction of 250 new school buildings will be initiated.

The programme to transform all lower primary schools into hi-tech schools is progressing with funding from KIIFB. Hi-tech computer labs will be set up in 11,400 schools. The Vidyashree project to distribute laptops to five lakhs school children under the auspices of KSFE and Kudumbasree will be completed within 100 days. 10 ITIs renovated at a cost of Rs. 18 crores will be inaugurated.

150 new courses will be allotted in government and aided colleges in the state. Land acquisition for the permanent campuses of APJ Abdul Kalam University and Malayalam University will be completed and their foundation stones will be laid. Buildings for 32 higher education institutions will be completed with an investment of Rs. 126 crores.

A special task force will be set up under the Departments of Law, Finance and General Administration to draft special rules with regard to the 11 institutions whose recruitments have been handed over to the PSC. Within 100 days, 1,000 posts will be created in the colleges and

higher secondary schools. 50,000 people will be employed in the non-agricultural sector through 15,000 new ventures. The main agencies will be Local Co-operative Banks, Kudumbasree, KFC, District Industrial Centres and Local Bodies. Each agency will publish additional jobs created, through a dedicated portal.

An amount of Rs. 961 crores will be provided from the Chief

Minister's Disaster Relief Fund for the renovation of 5,000 rural roads. Administrative sanction for Rs. 392.09 crores will be granted as part of the Rebuild Kerala Initiative, for rural roads. 189 PWD roads funded by KIIFB and built at a cost of Rs. 1,451 crores will be opened to traffic. 158 km of KSTP roads worth Rs. 901 crores and 21 bridges including Kundannur and Vyttila flyovers will be inaugurated in the next 100 days. 41 KIIFB

projects tendered for Rs. 671.26 crores will be inaugurated by November.

Of the 590 km of Kovalam -Bekal waterway, 453 km will be made navigable. Boat jetties at Champakulam, Parassinikkadavu and Pazhayangadi will be completed. Kochi Metropolitan Transport Authority and Safe Kerala Control Room will be inaugurated. The first electric hybrid cruise vessel, 2 catamaran boats and 2 water taxis will be launched. Port office building of the Vizhinjam International Port project will be inaugurated. In the next 100 days there will be a major breakthrough in realising the Wayanad Tunnel Route, for which the implementation agency is Konkan Railway.


We are setting up Kerala's first Open University as a memorial to the revered Sree Narayana Guru. The university will function as an integrated center for distance education in Kerala. Distance education systems of other universities in Kerala such as Kerala, MG, Calicut and Kannur will now be part of the new university.

Sree Narayana Guru was a proponent of non-formal education. The relevance of online courses is increasing day by day in the context of changes in the global work environment and the current Covid crisis. It is in this context that an open university in the public education sector is coming up in Kerala. Anyone of any age can join Open University courses. University shall issue diploma certificates for dropouts, if they are eligible.

The university will have a fully online academic system from registration to announcement

of results. In addition to the traditional courses, the Open University will also offer skills development courses. Higher education will become more popular through this. Eminent teachers and experts from national and international level will be taking online classes at this university.

With all these measures, we hope to reinvigorate various sectors

like agriculture, irrigation, electricity, spots, culture, local self governments and also traditional sectors like coir and cashew. Our government is striving to move forward with its commitment to development and social justice. The performance of the '100 Days, 100 Projects' campaign will be reviewed at all levels in the coming days. We would like to give the assurance that they will be completed on



# The 100 Days of 100 Beginnings...

When it comes to development Kerala has been in forefront at least for the last four years. The pace is not lost and the envisaged 100 programmes within 100 days typify this 'fact'.



To better leverage the ongoing social development initiatives, plans and projects in Kerala, the State Government has initiated 100 projects in 100 days programme. This initiative by the government to empower the people of Kerala is in line with the four principal projects announced by the State Government of Kerala in 2016, to comprehensively develop thrust areas of housing, health, education and agriculture under missions such as Haritha Keralam, Ardram, Life and the Comprehensive **Educational Rejuvenation** Programme.

Introduced as part of an action plan to boost the socio-economic status of the State, the Chief Minister said that Kerala's economic growth should not be stagnant due to the COVID-19 and it should face the new challenges according to the changing needs of the people ensuring speeding up projects that were delayed due to the pandemic.

The social security programme that has a wider acceptance among the downtrodden, the government has upgraded the system of distribution of social welfare pensions. The former system of paying the pension in lump sum periodically a few times in a year has been made into a monthly payment system and an increase in Rs.100 is ensured.

While boosting health infrastructure facilities, the Government took all possible measures to ensure adequate human resources to meet the rising demands of the situation. 9,768 healthcare workers have been recruited in a short span of time and more will be recruited based on the requirement in the coming 100 days.

Transforming the Primary

Health Centres (PHCs) into fully equipped Family Health Centres (FHCs) with hospital facilities is an ongoing process. and so far, 386 FHCs have been completed and commissioned. More FHCs will be inaugurated and new buildings will be completed as part of the Medical College / District / General / Taluk Hospitals in these 100 days project.

The Comprehensive Educational Rejuvenation Programme was envisaged to revive the education sector. Thirty-five school buildings built at a cost of Rs 5 crores and 14 school buildings constructed at a cost of Rs 3 crores were inaugurated as part of the 100 days programme. Further, construction of another 27 other school buildings will be completed and the construction of 250 new school buildings are planned to start. For higher education, plans are afoot to allot 150 new courses in government and aided colleges in the State.

Employment generation in the various sectors is a priority. Setting up of a special task

force will be completed under the Legal, Finance and Public Administration. Lead agencies such as Local Co-operative Banks, Kudumbasree, KFC, District Industrial Centres, and Local Bodies will inform the additional jobs created through a dedicated portal.

Infrastructure development is too given high priority. KIIFB funded 189 PWD roads built at a cost of Rs.1,451 crores will be opened soon. Within the next 100 days 158 km of KSTP roads worth Rs.901 crores and 21 bridges including Kundannur and Vyttila flyovers will be opened to the public.

The inauguration of Kochi Metropolitan Transport Authority and Safe Kerala Control Room will also be held in these 100 days project programme. The launch of the first electric hybrid cruise vessel in the State, two catamaran boats, and two water taxis, the inauguration of the Vizhiniam International Port Project Port Office Building, and the initial project process beginning to construct the. Wayanad Tunnel Route with the lead of Konkan Rail Corporation is among the other major projects in the offing.

The performance of the 100-day action plan would be reviewed at all levels to ensure timely execution and implementation of all the 100 projects in 100 days.

As Kerala fights the pandemic, COVID-19, the State Government have high hopes for the Kerala model of social security, health protection, infrastructure development, empowerment through education and entrepreneurship will be in line with the international movement of 'decade of action' in the coming decade.

It is a time of joy for third-grader Revathi and her sister Aarti. These little ones are excited to be setting up their 'first athapookalam' in a house built under the State Government's Life Mission Project.

They are the children of Biju and Radhamani at Revathi Bhavan, Chiratharakkal, Manikkal Panchayath in the Thiruvananthapuram district. As they did not have their own land, the panchayat itself took the initiative to buy land for them. Later, a house was allotted for them under the Life Mission. Toilets and wells were constructed under various schemes. They still have to add final touches to the house, but they are confident that they can finish it.

"But I did not think I could live in my own house so soon," says Radhamani. In her eyes, there is a glimmer of confidence and pride in having a house, provided by the state government.

Biju, a labourer, is out of job often in the rainy season. The family has had to leave many a home with tears in their eyes as they could not pay the rent properly during many Onam seasons. Now, with no one to evict them, Radhamani is celebrated this Onam with her husband, children and elderly mother in their own house.

The State Government's life mission is advancing rapidly despite the COVID-crisis, which has literally dragged the entire world backwards. Through the Life Mission, the dream of owning a home during Onam has become a reality for many families in the district.

### LIFE KOLLAM

Haridasan is feeling rather proud this Onam. A cattle farmer by profession, he lives in his new house in the village of Thazhuthala, Kottivam, in the district of Kollam. Haridasan considers it more of a consolation than of a joy to be able to celebrate Onam at the seven-cent house that was completed through the Life Mission. This is because his wife died of cancer five years ago.

It was impossible for them to dream of owning a home in those times, as they were facing many financial difficulties related to his wife's treatment. The family was also seeking financial support from the government.

Haridasan lives in his new house with his son. daughter-in-law and granddaughter. Considering this to be a new beginning in life, the family also thanked the State government for the benefit they received.

Indira's husband departed a year ago and they have no children. Her mother Jagadamma has age-related physical ailments. However, these women are proud to be able to live in their own home under the State government's care.

Sreekumar and his family from Muhamma, Alappuzha is on cloud nine and celebrating their happiness. It was their years of dream to have a house of their own and it has been accomplished through the State Government's Life Mission. Sreekumar is a driver, his wife Usha, an Asha Worker, children Sreemol and Sreehari were busy celebrating Onam in their new house. Sreekumar got this house in the 15th ward under the government's Life Mission Scheme.

The whole family was living in a shed for years. Sreekumar says his biggest dream was to have a well-built house. Now his children can continue their education properly with more comfort in their new home as they are excellent in studies.

Soudamini, her husband, Sasi, and their two children lived in five different rented houses over the span of 16 years. Three years ago, Soudamini submitted her application for a house in Life Mission, the State Government's total housing scheme. In the midst of the COVID-19 crisis, the local festivities were less lively, but this time it was an unforgettable Onam for Vinoj and his family; this is the first Onam in their own house and the fulfilment of a long-cherished dream for Vinoj, his wife Sunita and their children Alan and Milan.

The Life Mission of the State government has opened the door of hope for them as they found it impossible to build a house with their income. Lack of land to build a house prevented it from being considered in the first instance. He later received three cents from his father's property.

The government has provided Rs. 4 lakh for a 400 sq ft house with two bedrooms, hall, kitchen, veranda and toilet. In addition, he was included in the Mahatma Gandhi Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme and paid 90 days wages at the rate of Rs. 291 per day. The panchayat received a grant of Rs. 10,200 from the Sanitation Mission as incentive for the construction of a house. The family is also included in the comprehensive drinking water scheme implemented by the panchayat.

Sudalaiyappan and his family came to Kottayam from Tirunelveli in Tamil Nadu three decades ago, in search of work. This time his son Rajeev got a valuable Onam gift in the state where he was given a job and a life. The young man and his wife Saranya started living in a house built by Life Mission on the eye of the festival of Onam.

Rajeev first tried to build a house at Thottakkad Lakshmi Bhavan by saving money from his mending job. He applied for a house in Life Mission but was unsuccessful as he did not own a ration card. Later, a special order was issued by the government for the Scheduled Castes to join the Life Scheme. Rajeev was allotted a house as he had a family card which made him a beneficiary of the scheme under the new order. His new house occupies a total of 400 square feet and consists of two bedrooms, a hall, a kitchen and a bathroom.



# Kerala's Historic Tryst with Covid-19

Immediately after the declaration of the WHO regarding the outbreak, the State started its preparation to combat the novel corona virus. On 27th March, the Kerala epidemic disease ordinance was published. From testing to treatment, every aspect associated with the pandemic has been addressed with utmost care. These activities were conducted in a phased manner.



Phase-3 of the pandemic-control started with the unlocking of general lockdown by the end of June. The case positivity rate was 2.02 and the case fatality rate was 0.5 in Kerala. The cases were confined mainly to those passengers returned from foreign countries and other states. The contact cases were less than 10%. As the unlocking had started, the state was expecting a huge increase in contact cases as well as death. Grand campaign was launched with an objective to protect elderly and chronically ill patients through reverse quarantine.

Planning was done to set up COVID First - Line Treatment Centers (CFLTC) initially two per district and extending to one each per panchayath. The contact cases started increasing slowly and now more than 90% of cases are reported to be through contact. The first and second phases in the state there was not much cluster formation but several clusters have been reported in the third phase. The testing rates have been increased so as to attain a target of 50000 tests per day. For improving the 'health HR', COVID brigade has been mobilized to CFLTCs/ COVID hospitals.

Sufficient medical equipment, test kits, PPE, medicines etc are ensured. Adequate treatment facilities are available even if the cases are increasing up to 20000 per day. 24 - hour helpline centers are available in all districts to guide people who are in need of medical help. The Private sector is rolled into anti - COVID activities to a great extent.

Testing has been de-centralized by increasing the number of testing centers in the private and the public sector. Mobile medical surveillance units are set up for the needs of people under quarantine.

Containment zones declared by SDMA initially are de-centralized and decisions are now taken at the district level

Steps are taken to ensure reporting of results within practically possible time - frame and to avoid any undue delays in the whole process of sample management. Rates for testing is standardized in the private sector by the Government of Kerala. Walkin-Sample-Collection-Kiosks were first introduced in Kerala to address the main challenges of sample collection.

COVID hospitals are designated for the management of symptomatic patients and CFLTCs are designated for the management of asymptomatic positive patients. COVID second - line treatment centers were also identified and made functional. As the caseload increased, asymptomatic patients were allowed to remain at home in room quarantine. Clinical management of COVID patients in CFLTCs and COVID hospitals are done free of cost irrespective of the income status of the patient.

Now, daily reporting of cases is more than 2000 with an average death of 12 per day. But the indicators like case per million, test per million, case fatality rate etc. are the best in our state compared to the rest of India. The state is confident enough to manage the increasing load of cases with the involvement of various line departments and agencies, NGOs, volunteers etc. Above all, the educated people of Kerala who are well aware of the situation showing commitment and responsibility to overcome this crisis is giving strength to the State Government's robust measures to combat the pandemic.


### The Effective Response to the Pandemic has Historic Significance

The annals of history exemplifies the fact that healthcare was given much more importance in Kerala. Now, the health-oriented care has reached its zenith, thanks to the mission-mode governance that this happens sans obstacles.



When the Covid 19 pandemic hit our country, the mega cities such as Delhi, Mumbai and Chennai were initially the worst affected. Kerala had stood out by its performance in terms of containing the epidemic and restricting deaths in the early phase.

Once the non-resident citizens started coming back from parts of the world ravaged by the epidemic, there has been a resurgence of the epidemic in the state. New cases are reported in thousands every day. In spite of this setback, the state's resistance to the epidemic has been laudable compared to the rest of India. This is the outcome of a solid foundation of investment in health care.

Growth of education facilities paralleled development in health. All social reform movements in the state emphasised education and this was later to prove beneficial for acceptance of good health care. After the formation of the State, successive governments have spent a large proportion of their expenditure on these 'service' sectors. Share of public spending on health in Kerala was among the largest among the Indian states in the early years of the sixties and seventies. There was a great demand for healthcare from the common people, especially from women and children.

Childbirths were more and more moving from homes to healthcare institutions such as hospitals and nursing homes. In this, the improvement in education of the women helped: taboos against women coming out of their homes were fast disappearing. International scholars have commented that the absence of a doctor in a primary health centre

elicits public protests in Kerala, a unique situation in India. In Kerala, people were aware of their rights in health. That the great edifice of public health care in Kerala was built by public action was commented upon by such scholars as Amartya Sen.


The decentralisation of power to the panchayats and other local bodies which happened in 1996 was a great initiative in bringing control to the people. This brought the health institutions under the direct administration of the local bodies, and also provided more funds for them. This was a great opportunity for many local bodies to utilize the available funds and other resources to improve the facilities in hospitals.

With the passing of time, there arose strong partnerships between the local health administration and the local political administration in many panchayats and municipalities, raising their health institutions to a level rarely seen in public hospitals in India.

In recent years 10-20% of people have moved back to the public sector for their health care. The State Government has taken the initiative to make healthcare much more accessible at the local level through the Ardram mission. More sophisticated care is available at taluk and district hospitals as well as government medical colleges. The State Government has provided improved funding for care at different tiers of government institutions. The initiative in the health sector provided by the current political leadership is a leading factor which has resulted in the state's good performance in containing the covid-19 pandemic.

### A SURVIVOR'S MEMOIR

Idukki Engineering College Principal C. Satheesh Kumar, who has gone through the days of Covid –19 situation, has now fully recovered and returned to his job. He is remembering his days he had through and the subsequent survival.

I was having 99.5F temperature for four consecutive days, so I decided to take the test on July 20th. I was very tired and was having a sore throat. There were no other symptoms.

The test result came on July 22nd, I was positive. My symptoms disappeared by then. I had taken all the measures and precautions (always wearing a mask, sanitizing all the surfaces, keeping social distance) and yet the result was positive, which was a bit of hassle at first, but I was relieved when I got to CFLTC which was set up in the hostel of College of Engineering. There were about 80 people in this centre. No one had any significant symptoms or difficulties. No one was seriously ill or had to be taken to the hospital. By the time everyone got there, within three or four days, their symptoms were completely gone. There were people of all ages like from small children to elder ones. When the food packages arrive, the children would knock at every door to let us know. Once in two days, rooms were cleaned and wiped with disinfectants by staff wearing PPE kits.

Every morning, a doctor and a nurse wearing PPE kits would come into the room and enquired about the health condition. The services of at least two nurses were always available on each floor. The test held on the tenth day of admission was reported to be negative and I was discharged. I was not charged for any treatments or food from the moment I was tested positive till I got discharged from CFLTC. Covid tests and all other

charges were taken care of by the State Government. Since the discharge certificate from Idukki Medical College had suggested two weeks of home isolation, I decided to stay in the isolation room of college staff instead of going home. Even after the discharge, Dr. Christy from the medical college reviewed my health - condition over phone. Another doctor from the Government Ayurveda Hospital too called with the same purpose.

After 10 days in CFLTC and 14 days in isolation room, I was first reluctant to interact with others when I was back into normal life. I am healthy now. Consuming those ayurvedic medicines I received through Punarjani scheme had wonderful 'effect'.

The 'planning work' done by our State Government to ensure every COVID patient gets the best care and attention at zero cost is something worth mentioning, if not laudable. There are so many health workers who have helped me directly and indirectly, hence I am not mentioning the names. It is best to stay at home as much as possible. Wear a mask and maintain at least six feet distance away from others while going out for essential needs.

I confirm based on my experience, that we should not fear COVID, but be vigilant. What should be kept away is the disease not the patient. Lets get rid of this virus by following the guidelines.

### A Leap Forward in the Field of **Higher Education**

Any attempt to enhance the expansion of the education sector is considered as a pragmatic initiative and in that The State Government ups its ante by introducing the 'Open University', the first-of-its-kind in the history of the State.



The Chief Minister made a declaration revolutionizing the Higher education system in the State by establishing an Open University headquartered at Kollam, aptly in the name of Sree Narayana Guru- a great saint, teacher, philosopher, scholar and a social reformer. The Central Government introduced the Open University system during the 1980s, with the objective to further democratize opportunities for higher education to a large segment of the Indian population, particularly those for whom access was difficult or impossible. The growth of Open Education System has been exponential over the last four decades in the country beginning with the establishment of Dr. B R Ambedkar Open University, Hyderabad in 1982. Till now, 13 open state universities were established in various States in India. The open universities offer all kinds of programmes ranging from vocational to general and professional to technical.

Open universities also occupy a coveted position in the Indian Higher Education System because of its major contribution in enhancing the Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER). The All India Survey on Higher Education (AISHE)



Report published recently states that in India the GER is 26.3% out of which 10.62% constitute the students admitted through the Distance Education mode, Hence, it is an established fact that with the opening of the Open University the GER in the State will naturally increase. The decision to start an Open University is the result of a positive approach on the part of the State Government to increase the GER in the State from the current 37%.

The new experiment of establishing an open university in the State may lead to the opening of the portals of higher education to a variety of potential students covering different spectrums of society and profession who would otherwise not be able to acquire new skills and higher qualifications. It will provide an innovative system of university-level education which is both flexible and open in terms of methods and pace of learning, a combination of courses, eligibility for enrolment, age of entry, the conduct of examination and implementation of the programmes of study. Distance education is a lifelong activity which enables assiduous individuals to update their knowledge and also acquire new knowledge in diversified areas.





### CM Announces Development of Government Schools



Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan announced the completion of 14 government school buildings at a cost of Rs. 3 crore, as part of the 100-day Action Plan. The inauguration of 34 completed Higher Secondary School buildings in various constituencies of the state were carried out through video conferencing.

Construction of 250 new school buildings will begin soon. More than 350 schools are being provided with basic facilities using plan funds. The Chief Minister also congratulated schools in the state for their online education efforts. Special mention was given to the role of KIIFB in the development of the state.

"More effort is needed to improve. Our needs to be identified and addressed. Schools as centers of excellence will be equipped in all constituencies without bias or exclusion," the Chief Minister added.

Kerala has achieved the number one position in the School Education Index prepared and released by NITI Aayog, reflecting the State's efforts to invest and improve the public education system.

"Our policy is to further strengthen our public education sector. The goal is to make more schools centers of excellence," said the Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan.

The state has implemented various schemes in the education sector in the past four years. Government schools which were on the verge of closure were acquired and rebuilt to improved standards, turning them into valuable learning centers.

Being a beneficiary Sreedharan Pillai is too happy these days as he is getting his due sans hindrance. He says -"I am 83 years old and my wife is 76. We can't go to work anymore as we are old. A Direct-to-Home content mix of the OTT Platforms owes much to the popularity of the relatively new genre, the Web Series! OTTs are pushing Web Series as an effective alternative for movies as such. The content mix and production quality of many super hit web series, the new genre that is available only through the net over the top; do make millions of net-addicts every day.

This is something extremely different from the dubbed versions. Moreover, web series never get elongated to more than 10 episodes. Instead of stretching itself into hundreds of never-ending episodes as in the case of TV serials, Web Series try to exploit their success by coming up with more and more Seasons across several years. Thus, each vear, they attract more and more audience too over the seasons. Media Experts call this as Binge Viewing.

True that the term Web Series is being misused and misrepresented widely on the internet by producers of Youtube serials. But the professionally executed web series is much more than that, which has proved to be the real threats to commercial movies.


### In the Name of these Spices!

#### Kasturi turmeric caught in the 'fair and lovely' trap!

Given the social or cultural mindset where beauty is ingrained in the psyche and daily routine of damsels and laymen alike, be it for enhancing the skin complexion or the craze for a blonde look, there is every chance of unscrupulous elements or knaves exploiting the gullible public for quick buck in the name of beauty products . The humble Kasturi turmeric ('Kasturi manjal'), commonly used in toiletry articles, especially facial creams is one such commodity caught in the 'beauty trap'.

The craze for instant beauty comes in handy for the quacks to trade some other common Curcuma rhizomes in the guise of original Kasturi turmeric. The most common turmeric sold in the guise of genuine Kasturi turmeric is a yellow rhizome entity, Curcuma zedoaria.

It is high time that we recognize the unfair means in the 'fair skin' market. aware of the fake entity and root for the genuine root, putting a full stop for the cosmetic ride by quacks.

#### **Black Turmeric** superstition rules the roost!

Given the social mooring of superstition laced with ignorance, black turmeric is much sought-after entity for sorcery, magic rites, tantric sadhana and many other clandestine activities.

Black turmeric or 'Kali Haldi' is scientifically Curcuma caesia (Fig.2). As the name suggests, the inner core colour of the rhizome is blue - black, not the familiar yellow or pale-yellow colour, one is commonly familiar with turmerics. The rhizomes are aromatic (camphoraceous), bitter in taste, stimulant, carminative and rubefacient used topically for sprains and bruises.

Two distinct species are known as black ginger, namely Zingiber malaysianum ('Midnight Black' or Midnight Ginger), an ornamental plant with blackish - red foliage and Kaempferia parviflora (Thai black ginger, Thai ginseng or Krachai dum, Durik Ada, 'Karkashur / Yaimu') with bluish - black rhizome(Fig3), the latter being more important for its medicinal uses.

Monks pepper(Vitex agnuscastus,)otherwise known as Chaste tree/Chaste berry ,family Lamiaceae; Selim pepper(Xylopia aethiopica), family Annonaceae well known as Kani pepper, Senegal pepper, Ethiopian pepper and Guinea pepper etc., either of the genus Piper itself or non-Piper genus, apart from the ubiquitous chilli pepper(Capsicum sp.), valued as functional foods or medicine.




Fig.6. Sichuan pepper
